

Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. but emptied himself,

taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,



### TWO HANDS, ONE HEART, A KEYBOARD, AND A LIFETIME OF MUSIC FOR GOD

In 1951 Joan Lamar Kearns was a freshman at the Women's College of the University of North Carolina, now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. She would soon marry a Navy sailor named Bob and become Joan Lamar Kearns Clodfelter. Also that year she would climb onto the organ bench at Grace Episcopal Church in Lexington, North Carolina, and, hold onto your hat . . . she is still there!

Seventy two years later, she indeed is still there. And her tenure marches on.

From 1951 to 1963 Joan served as a substitute and special services organist for Grace, playing for wedding and funeral services as well as some Sundays.

In 1963, Joan became the permanent Organist and Choir Director at Grace Episcopal Church.

Yet, not to break the heart of her loyalist Lutheran mother, she continued her local Lutheran Church membership for decades to come. She later became a member of our Episcopal parish in the 1980s, safely after her dear mother's passing to the nearer presence of our Lord. To hear Joan's take on it all, her Episcopal transfer likely triggered her mother to cause a great disturbance among the "cloud of witnesses" and the "communion of saints"! (See, inter alia, Hebrews 11-12 and the Apostles Creed. See also, Alec Guinness as Obi-Wan Kenobi: "I felt a great disturbance in the Force, as if millions of voices suddenly cried out in terror and were suddenly silenced. I fear something terrible has happened." Star Wars: Episode IV – A New Hope, 1977)

It's not just the 72 years. It's the godly light Joan casts upon those who know her. An inspiring wife, mother, grandmother, friend, and mentor to many, she has endured all the trials and tribulations life brings without diminishment of her ministry.

Small in stature, yet giant in impact, Joan is a force to be reckoned. She doesn't merely preside over a choir rehearsal, she holds court! At rehearsals, her opening "stand up" routine is the stuff of late night talk shows filled with quips, self-deprecating humor, biblical and cultural comical references, and anecdotes of every flavor. Her wit is exceedingly brilliant, her mind is electrically fast, her energy is dynamic, her inspiration is contagious, her influence on the lives of others is permanent, and her uninhibited, plainspoken, and ready witness to Jesus is inspiring. The brilliance of her musicianship and her zeal for perfection remain undiminished decades later. All of this comes from someone old enough to have served for 72 years since college. How old is Joan? Ageless. Timeless.

Reigning above all her attributes and virtues is Joan's faith. She loves our Lord deeply and openly. She is the living embodiment of Bach's "Soli Deo Gloria" – to God alone be the Glory – shying away from all spotlights, accolades, tributes, applause, or flattery.

Such humility surely made it tricky to plan Grace Church's October 1, 2023 grand celebration of her 60<sup>th</sup> year of permanent ministry, 72 years counting her previous part-time service. The festivities include the naming of the parish's newly renovated organ in her honor, a concert by a celebrated organist, vocal and instrumental performances by parishioners, the homecoming of several choir alumni, a grand reception, special gifts, and much more. Even all that falls short of the unspeakable gratitude and admiration of the hearts of the parish.

Joan Clodfelter is anointed and ordained to use her spiritual gifts to lead God's people to deepened faith and service. So much so, that I once exclaimed to a group knowing her well that I have never seen the likes of her before. The quick and almost reflexive reply in unison was, "And you never will again." Amen!

As her Rector, I recently confessed to Joan how I would be so very sad if she were to retire, especially if it were sudden. Drawing from her bottomless faith and pastoral tenderness, her response was a gift from Genesis 28:15, "I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you."

It is certain that there is robust approval of Joan's devotion among the communion of saints and the great cloud of witnesses, including most especially her dear Mom. Even more certain is that God is whispering in love to Joan, "Well done, good and faithful servant!"

## North Carolina Episcopal church to honor organist for 60 years of service

[Episcopal News Service] On Oct. 1, Grace Episcopal Church, Lexington, North Carolina, will honor Joan Clodfelter, its minister of music, for 60 years of full-time service to the church by, among other things, naming the organ in her honor.

Of those years, she told Episcopal News Service, "It's been quite wonderful, all 60 of them."

Clodfelter, 89, has spent nearly a lifetime playing music. She started taking piano lessons when she was 8 years old, and at 14 she was asked to play the organ for the Lutheran church she and her family attended. She played there throughout high school and while she attended the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. In 1951, when she was a college freshman, she began playing at Grace Church for some weddings and funerals, plus a few Sundays – an arrangement that lasted for 12 years.

In 1963, when the church needed a full-time organist and choir director, Clodfelter was hired, and she has stayed ever since.

Things were a little different in those early days, she told ENS. Worship was in a small brick building that later became the chapel after the current church was built in 1985. Choir rehearsals were in the nearby rectory, where the priest and his family lived. But the biggest changes, she said, came with the adoption of a new Book of Common Prayer in 1979 and Hymnal in 1982.

According to a statement about Clodfelter from the church's rector, the Rev. Ed Kelaher, she remained a Lutheran when she took the job at Grace until after her mother died so as not to break "her Lutheran loyalist heart." It was an easy change, Clodfelter said, because after so many services at Grace, "I felt so Episcopalian."

Since then, she said, "Being associated with The Episcopal Church and providing music has been the crowning glory of my life."

One of the best parts of her work, Clodfelter said, is leading the choir. But, Kelaher said, "She doesn't merely preside over a choir rehearsal, she holds court." He said that during rehearsals, "her opening 'stand up' routine is the stuff of late-night talk shows filled with quips, self-deprecating humor, biblical and cultural comical references, and anecdotes of every flavor."

Clodfelter said the associations she has made with so many choir members have been deeply important. "The choir has become my family over the years," she said. "I have played for choir members' weddings, the baptism of their children, weddings of children and grandchildren, and their funerals."

A lifelong resident of Lexington, she also has had a full life outside of music at the church. She and her husband Bob, who died in 2005, had four children and, eventually, six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren, and she still sees them all regularly. She also spent 25 years teaching first- and second-grade students, which she had to give up when she was diagnosed with cancer and needed to minimize exposure to viruses and germs while undergoing treatment. But during that time, she never missed a Sunday at the organ, she said, and she recovered and remains cancer-free.

She and Bob also loved to travel, visiting 48 states, missing only Alaska and Hawaii. One of her joys was spotting an Episcopal church as they drove through a town and then stopping in to see it. "I have been in lots of Episcopal churches," she said, "including the little church in Independence, Missouri, where Margaret Truman was married. I even played a few hymns on their organ while visiting." They had stopped at Trinity Church, which also hosted the wedding of Margaret Truman's parents, Harry and Bess Truman, in 1919, 26 years before he became the 33rd president of the United States.

Clodfelter said she truly has enjoyed providing music for Grace Church, where she serves "a wonderful parish full of loving, committed people" and called Kelaher "a wonderful priest for us, very pastoral."

In summing up her years of service she said, "I love to play the organ and the opportunity to be involved in music. I've stayed because of my love for the Book of Common Prayer."

Kelaher said Clodfelter's humility made planning a 60th-anniversary celebration tricky, but the parish managed to pull it together. In addition to naming the organ in her honor during the 10:30 a.m. service, there will be an afternoon organ concert, as well as vocal and instrumental performances by parishioners, the homecoming of several choir alumni, a reception and the presentation of special gifts.

But, he said, regarding how parishioners see Clodfelter, "all that falls short of the unspeakable gratitude and admiration of the hearts of the parish."

### LEXINGTON'S GRACE EPISCOPAL WILL CELEBRATE ORGANIST'S 60 YEARS ON THE BENCH

At the tender age of 10, Joan Kearns Clodfelter first felt lust.

But don't start the paperwork to excommunicate this faithful Lutheran and eventually Episcopalian servant.

Her desire was not fueled by fresh, strong drink or some other sin warned about in the Good Book. She fell under the spell of the organ. Yes, the musical instrument that she has dutifully played since she was 13, which is a another amazing story we'll get to eventually, called to her like the sirens to sailors from the first time she heard one played.

"When I was in the fifth grade, my teacher asked my mother if she could take me to First UCC (United Church of Christ) to see what an organ looked like," she said, noting she had been taking piano lessons since she was 8 and playing piano at school for plays and performances for her class. "The organist at the church showed me the organ and the sounds it could make. I tell people I did not fall in love with the organ that day, I fell in lust. I just loved the idea of playing an instrument that could make such different sounds."

Clodfelter is being honored Oct. 1 at Grace Episcopal Church in Lexington, where she has been the organist for the past 60 years, with an organ concert by Davidson County native Michael Surratt at 4 p.m. A reception will follow the concert in the Parish Hall. Both are open to the public. The church is 419 S. Main St.

When she was 13, Clodfelter's big debut on the organ came about under odd circumstances at First Lutheran Church in Lexington, where she attended with her family and became a member. She and her mother were attending a wedding when an usher came up and said: "The organist has left. I wonder if Joan could play some songs on the organ for the wedding."

"My mother said, 'Surely she will,'" Clodfelter recalled. "I was stunned. You have to understand that back then, children did not tell their parents no. I just went up there and played what I knew."

From then on, Clodfelter played the organ at her Lutheran church for weddings, funerals, church services and any other time she was asked. Word about the talented teen spread across the city and county. She was asked to play at other churches, as well, through her time in high school.

After graduating from Lexington Senior High, Clodfelter headed off to Woman's College, now the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, to earn her primary education degree, and she took organ classes as an elective.

At the time, the person who was the full-time organist at Grace Episcopal enjoyed taking vacations, especially around holidays, to visit her family up North, so the church began calling on Clodfelter to fill in when she came home to Lexington from college for the same holidays. So although Clodfelter has been the full-time, employed organist at Grace Episcopal for 60 years, she has been playing there, including her time as a fill-in, for more than 70 years.

She became the full-time organist at Grace in 1963. In the early years, she would perform her duties at Grace and then walk over to First Lutheran to sit with her mother for the rest of the Lutheran service. When she married, her husband, Bob Clodfelter, joined the Lutheran Church and took their four children to First Lutheran while she played at Grace Episcopal each Sunday.

"I came here because I loved to play the organ. This church has always had a beautiful organ," she said, sweeping her hands through the air to point out the shiny, silver pipes that tower over the sanctuary. "I stayed because I love the (Episcopal) Book of Common Prayer and the wonderful people that have been in this congregation over the years."

She did not move her membership to Grace Episcopal until after her mother's death. She said she just didn't want to risk any disappointment her mother may have had in her leaving the family church.

But Grace Episcopal had long been her church family. She eventually took on the duties of choir director, also.


"I realized, I had been Episcopalian for a long time, but I did not want to change my membership until she died," Clodfelter said.

Clodfelter also taught in Lexington City elementary schools for 25 years, and after retirement she went back to be a part-time reading tutor for 17 years.

Clodfelter usually stays where she is, doing things she loves for a long time. But at 89, she said, retirement from playing the organ at Grace is imminent.

"I don't want to become a cartoon organist," she said. "I have seen some of those, and it's not pretty. I think it is time for new blood. It's just time. ... I'm not sure how I will feel with someone else playing the organ. I will just have to figure that out."


