#### TURN ON THE LIGHT

In the beginning was the Word,
and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.
He was in the beginning with God.
All things were made through him,
and without him nothing was made that has been made.
In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind.
The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

Iohn 1:1-5

The darkness has not overcome it . . .

The darkness of our lives has not overcome the light of Christ.

The darkness of the world has not overcome the light of Christ.

The darkness of our lives and the world will *never* overcome the light of Christ.

Amen!



The Christmas story began in the night, in the darkness. Joseph and Mary arrived in Bethlehem in the dark and their greeting was dark. There is no room for you, they heard, but the barn is available. In a modern reference this would be akin to an offering of a storage shed behind an overcrowded budget motel.

The light of the world, Jesus, came to earth at night almost unseen, unrecognized, and unheralded. His prospects would seem bleak and impossible, except we know from the Psalmist that "darkness is not dark to you, the night is as bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you." Jesus is self-illuminating by his divinity, holiness, and eternal beauty. There is no darkness in him. Wherever he goes, he turns on the light for all who come to him.

You and I have no such self-illuminating ability. We have no way to spiritually soothe ourselves, much less to save ourselves. And left to ourselves we fall into despair, fear, ugliness, depression, sin, and yes, darkness. But then comes Christ at Christmas. Then comes the light of the world into our hearts and lives. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness — on them light has shined," wrote the prophet Isaiah.



As the children of God, our lives are filled with joy and the Apostle Paul teaches us to be joyful in all circumstances because of what God has done for us in Christ Jesus. Yet, our broken human nature and frailty make it easy to lose our joy and fall into fear, anxiety, and darkness.

Humanism would suggest that we can find ways to conquer these afflictions and turn on our own inner lights. The prophet Isaiah, the Holy Scriptures, and the Holy Spirit would counter that human enlightenment is not enough, that there is no health within us, and that we cannot illuminate ourselves, much less save ourselves. Thus Christmas. Thus, Jesus comes into the world as the ultimate divine light to focus powerful glowing beams upon the path to God and away from our loneliness, waywardness, and gloom. Only God can do that. Only God can turn on the light in our darkness. And Jesus is God.

At Christmas, the blazing, dazzling light of divine love, grace, glory, and rescue comes into the world – better, into our hearts and lives. At Christmas, Jesus comes, and he is the very incarnation of all those wonders.



Throughout Advent, we proclaim and cling to the four Christ inspired themes of hope, peace, joy, and love, one for each Sunday of the season. On Christmas Eve, we light the center Christ Candle of our Advent Wreath, indicating that Jesus is the light of the world who is the incarnation and embodiment of all four themes. This is a holy season. Holy because it draws us into the light and nearer to God the Father, by the coming of God the Son, through the power of God the Holy Spirit.

For some, this season is enriched by times with family, dear friends, church family members, and even strangers we may be blessed to love. For others, this season is a lonely struggle. Christmas is perhaps most of all for those who are alone and for those who struggle without the fullness of God's joy. It is to them that Jesus comes rushing so lovingly, caringly, and tenderly. Christmas is about Christ, nothing more and nothing less. And he is the only remedy for lonely, struggling, and broken hearts. He is the only light for the darkness that has overcome them, and he privileges us to be "lights to the world" in his name. He privileges us to be light bearers when we carry him in our hearts. He privileges us to turn on his light for those who need him.

We approach Christmas reminded that the holiest places on earth are within an arm's reach. Taking time to converse with the lonely, to embrace a stranger, to give to the poor, or to visit the sick, is a time for us to turn on the light of Christ in the midst of another's darkness. Jesus calls us to do that for him. "In as much as you do these things for the least of my brothers and sisters, you do them for me." Matthew 25.



Christmas is most purely the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. It is a spectacularly appropriate time to exchange gifts to honor him. And perhaps the very best gift we can give each other is the gift of turning on his light in every place of darkness.

An exciting part of our Vestry's Capital Campaign vision is for the renovation and improvement of many areas of our buildings and outdoor campus. Our Campaign booklet illustrates most of those projects. Many of these projects have been desired for years, or even decades. To see them in actual progress and eventual completion is rewarding and fulfilling to most everyone.



The very first renovations directed by the Vestry, and overseen by our Junior Warden, Marjorie Parker, are our Parish Hall, the Parish Hall Kitchen, and the creation of a new Children's Nursery in the area once used as a Parish Hall stage. This wing of our education and office building was constructed in 1953.

These extensive and very complicated challenges would normally require a coordinating general contractor at a significant 5-figure cost. Grace Church is blessed however to have John Taylor, a Facilities Manager of exceptional vision, energy, focus, and determination. Though employed to work a small number of part-time hours each week, John has regularly provided 50 and 60 hour weeks for many months.

Working closely with our Junior Warden, Staff, and



some of our Vestry's Building and Grounds Committee members, John laid out a remarkable physical plan and the necessary scope of work. He thereafter contacted, interviewed, and obtained bids from many contractors until the Church was provided with quality contractors at fair prices.

John's work included the coordination of contractors

for demolition, new carpentry, finished carpentry, a new water and drain pipe system, electrical replacements, an entirely new HVAC



system, internet upgrades, dry wall applications, painting, a new ceiling system, floor refinishing, and the first insulation our 1953 building has ever seen. And that's not everything.

We are also very thankful for Richie Wiederhold and Shep Husted who devoted themselves for months providing huge chunks of the work on a contract basis. Thank you, Richie and Shep!

Beyond that, John performed a great amount of the work himself, including countless trailer-towing trips to the county waste facility with demolition debris. His deep faith, devotion, care – and determined intensity – have given Grace Church impressive and beautiful results - *all amazingly under budget!* 



We now have a very special and newly furnished Nursery in the old stage area, immediately adjacent to our playground. For many years, the two bathrooms on either side of the new Nursery were completely inoperable but are now beautifully renovated, including a baby changing table.

The Parish Hall Kitchen has all new cabinetry, granite countertops, hardwood floors, lighting, ceiling, plumbing fixtures, and appliances – stove, refrigerator, and dishwasher. The improvements include the complete renovation of the laundry/utility/storage room adjacent to the Kitchen, including a new hot water system, electrical/breaker wiring upgrades, stainless steel shelving, alarm system control boxes, hardwood flooring, ceiling system, and lighting.



Finally, there is our spectacular new Parish Hall itself! The refinished hardwood floors are stunning. The new lighting system is recessed into the new ceiling system, elevated at a dramatic 10½ feet. The new sheetrock walls and paint give the entire room a new look to send us into the decades ahead. Brand new dining tables, lovely, 100 upholstered chairs. and other furnishings are now on site and in place.

All new doors and the replacement of awkward old steps and handrails are also now in place.

Remember that all these areas have new windows, replacing the original 1953 windows, installed a year or two ago with the help of a partial grant the Church received.



Our annual Parish Christmas Party will be the first-ever event for our new Parish Hall.

Come celebrate on Friday evening, December 20.

On Sunday December 22, immediately following our worship service, we will have the formal dedication ceremony for our new Parish Hall, together with a special fellowship and refreshments hour.

#### **Advocacy Day Postcard Campaign 2025**

The Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina is inviting us to participate in Advocacy Day 2025.

Participation is easy, and it offers us as individuals and as a congregation an opportunity to express concerns for issues affecting all people in our state and community.

In January and February, the Social Concerns Commission will announce several opportunities—social hour after services, collection during services, email responses, and more—for congregants to write on postcards issues for which they feel great concern. Advocacy issues might include gun violence prevention, creation care, affordable housing, racial justice, homelessness, education, elder care, mental health,

gender equality, gender identity, and more. Social Concerns will collect the postcards and deliver them by hand to the Diocesan House by March 1.

Your job is to prayerfully consider issues affecting you, your family, your friends and neighbors, and others who live among us.

Our parish voice will join with the chorus of voices across the state to advocate for what is decent, right, and just in a local and global community of faith, loving all others as Jesus has commanded us.

Our extensive Parish Hall, Parish Hall Kitchen, and Children's Nursery renovations are all but behind us. This was Phase One of our ambitious renovation plan. Thank you, God! So, what happens next?

After some weeks to celebrate Christmas and to give our Facilities Manager and Junior Warden some time to gather themselves, progress will continue with Phase Two throughout our education and office building. Here's what you should expect.

- All the 1953 windows on the first and second floors will be replaced – 18 in total.
- 2. All the unsightly electrical panels, conduits, and visible wires in the main hallway will be relocated or buried in the walls or ceiling.





- 3. All the unsightly HVAC aluminum ducts will be removed or concealed.
- 4. The rainwater damaged stucco/plaster walls of the Chapel will be properly repaired and restored, with the entire Chapel to be painted. The rainwater seepage problem has already been fully remedied, together with all issues concerning crawlspace water accumulation.



5. The Chapel will also receive electrical renovations where needed.

- The awkwardly high and risky steps leading from the hallway into the Chapel's altar area will be replaced by 2 steps of proper height.
- 7. A ramp will replace the hallway stairs adjacent to the current Rector's Office providing coast-to-coast wheelchair access



from the Commons Room to the Parish Hall and back – including unhindered access to the existing handicap designed bathroom.

- 8. The current Rector's Office will be renovated to provide the moving of its entry door to allow ramp
  - construction, a 4-foot enlargement of the room, a vestments closet, a new drop ceiling, new ceiling lighting, bookshelves, and new flooring.
- New sheetrock/drywall will be installed throughout the first and second floor hallways and in rooms with bare cinder block walls.

There will be more aspects of the Phase Two renovations, but this list is fairly comprehensive.

Once completed, likely in the spring of 2025, we will move on to Phase Three, which will include significant renovations to our main Church building, the refinishing of the Commons Room metal roof, the resurfacing of our 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue parking lot, and more. Please look to our Capital Campaign brochure for a more complete listing of the work to be done.

Remember that much of this wonderful plan will depend on the fulfillment of our Capital Campaign goal of \$1,000,000 - with a bit more than \$200,000 still hoped for from the remaining gifts to be given.

Please say your prayers and lovingly provide your gift to God.

As you see, the fruit of our gifts has been a true blessing of the Holy Spirit!

### New Grief Share Group starts January 7, 2025

Grief Share is a 13 week, Christ-centered grief support group program. A new group will begin January 7, 2025. Participants will meet on Tuesdays from 6:00 to 8:00 pm in the Commons Room. There is no charge.

Each session includes a 30-minute video, followed by small group, discussion. This ministry is co-facilitated by Mary Crump and Pam Harvey. If there are any questions, they will be glad to provide more information.



These are just a few comments shared by participants at the end of the Grief Share sessions in Spring 2024.

Grief Share guided me through my journey and helped me to understand and navigate the unfamiliar feelings and thoughts I was having. It helped me be open and accepting.

It's okay to not be okay. It's okay to be angry. It's part of healing. Get it out!!

I liked that the program allowed you to see scenarios of real people and their experiences. I also liked the feel of friendship within our group.

I don't feel all is settled in my journey, but I do feel Grief Share group is a work in progress. It has given me the tools to face whatever situation may present itself.

I appreciate that you gave people time and support when they became emotional.



When our Vestry boldly, prayerfully, and faithfully announced its Capital Campaign initiative to honor God with a \$1 million goal, many were very surprised and some even questioned if it could be done. After all, we are a small church. The deciding factor though isn't how big our church might be but instead how big our God is within the hearts of our church!

God is inspiring the hearts of the Grace Church family! There is every reason to have faith that we will reach our total! Let's be clear though. We have not yet reached our aspired amount though we are between 75% and 80% of the goal with *many households* still indicating that a pledge is coming.






The most important criteria is overall participation. Whether we reach our financial goal or not, the more important goal is to reach 100% participation of our people who are all in different situations. Our prayer is that everyone might give something so that we might be one together in Christ. Some of us are able to give perhaps \$1,000 over the 3-year campaign scope, while others might be able to give a six-figure gift right now. God knows that people are in different places financially but instead intends that we be in the same place sharing — with each of us to delightfully make whatever gift to the Lord we might be able.

Our campaign continues until December 31. Our Vestry members will be contacting many of the households who have not yet provided their gifts. Remember, gifts can be spread over the next 36 months or be given up front, or somewhere inbetween. If you need a campaign booklet describing our vision and the application of the gifts, just contact the church office or anyone on the Vestry.

Please say your prayers and complete campaign pledge card by December 31. Your gift will enable Grace Church evermore fulfill its Gospel mission as we completely restore our buildings and set stage for the generations to come after us.

#### A New Prayer List Practice

Beginning January 1, our Prayer List will include a provided name for 3 months, after which the name will be rotated off the list in good faith.

If someone requests that the name be included longer or that the name be reinstated, of course we will gladly, cheerfully, and faithfully do so.

Our goal is to include as many names as might be in need of prayers and love, while being responsible to ensure that faithful praying people are not praying unnecessarily.



Not only will our new practice make our prayers more effective and efficient, but it will serve to heighten and sharpen the attention and care given to the list by all of us. Holy management of the Prayer List requires excellence, thoughtfulness, awareness, and liveliness – all of which are improved by the mindful

consideration of the current conditions and needs of those for whom we are praying in love and faith. Please continue to provide new names for our Prayer List whenever someone might be served by this ministry.

Our book is WE SURVIVED THE END OF THE WORLD: LESSONS FROM NATIVE AMERICA ON APOCALYPSE AND HOPE by Choctaw elder and retired Episcopal bishop Steven Charleston.

"You'd be hard-pressed to find an apocalypse more total than the one Native America has confronted for more than four hundred years," says the book's jacket cover. "Yet Charleston's ancestors are a case study in the liberating and hopeful survival of a spiritual community."

In the book, Charleston highlights four indigenous communities whose ongoing practices have given them courage and dignity to survive 400 years of struggle. Their models of spiritual strength and enduring hope serve as lessons for Christian communities as we face

an uncertain future of war, pandemic, natural disaster, and environmental collapse. Here, we can learn from our brothers and sisters how not only to keep our faith but to strengthen it as we move forward.
